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Thesis Title: The Influence of Religiosity, Alienation and Democratic Values on Democratic Behavior (Political participation and Antidictatorial Rule) of Faculty Members and Students of Public Universities

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This research had two objectives: Firstly, to get basic information about religiosity, alienation, democratic values and democratic behavior of Faculty Members and students of State University: Secondly, to analyze relationships and affection between religiosity, alienation, democratic values and democratic behavior. The sample sizes were 614 cases, 218 faculty members and 396 students. Multistage sampling was used in collecting the data, as was the LISREL program for analyzing. We found that Firstly, Faculty Members and students were less religious, not much in alienation, moderate in democratic values and also no strong indication of political behavior. Totally we found that all 4 variables were significantly correlated, except correlation between alienation and religiosity and also alienation and democratic values. However, when we analyzed affection separately in couple of variables we found that democratic values had most affection on democratic behavior and also had religiosity and alienation accordingly. Secondly, religiosity was positively and significantly affect to democratic behavior but not significantly to alienation. And also alienation was positively and significantly affect to democratic behavior but not significantly to democratic values. However, democratic values had more positively and significantly affection to democratic behavior than religiosity had.
